

Mauk Design combines elite



A "software vending machine" for IBM lets you download demos and software by satellite transmission. Gee + Chung's spacestation concept engagingly humanizes an interaction that isn't generally thought of as fun.

For Earth Day '95, Morla Design skipped the usual narrative illustration in favor of a blackand-white collage of natural structures. Notice the eyes: faces are usually focal points, but this one is a rest stop on a tense diagonal movement between two op-art graphics.
